WHY ACCIDENTAL **ART?**

Too easy, too mechanical, too common, too... democratic. Artists, curators, cultural pundits, they've been warning us about this photography thing for a good 150 years now. Science yes, craft sure, art never.

It started when photography was invented. Portrait painters were the first to feel the pinch. Then George Eastman put a Brownie in great grandma's hand, and the floodgates were opened wide.

With access to cheap, easy to use cameras, photography quickly become the medium of everyman. Instagram didn't invent the selfie, they just made it faster.

Artists, the real ones, responded by painting their impressions of things, dreamscapes, or random abstractions that shared little (besides paint and canvas) with their predecessors.

Businesses responded by buying advertising. Advertising that relied on photography, published in magazines that also relied on photography.

At first, the photographers making all these pictures were considered craftsmen, but then somebody noticed that some were better than the rest. They may have used the same equipment and had similar technical skills, but somehow the pictures they made were more insightful. Their pictures moved people, told stories and captured moments in a way that allowed viewers to feel and understand what it may have been like to witness an event firsthand.

The photographers who could do this, make pictures that weren't just a record of an event, but images that captured something deeper and spoke to the human condition. These people, these craftsmen, became valuable to the advertisers and magazines who needed to connect with everyman.

Still, these talented folks were not quite artists and the images they were making were not quite art, at least in the opinion of those who's opinions mattered.

The photographers on the other hand, knew exactly what they were doing. True, some might have avoided using the art word, but that didn't stop them from making it.

In 1972, when Life Magazine closed, few would have guessed that many of the images first seen on its pages would be highly prized by museums and collectors today.

It wasn't easy, automatic or accomplished by common people, yet here we are.






















